We held a Face-to-Face meeting near Ballarat in Victoria, made progress with National Park staff in several states, been part of a new Fertility Control development, had international exposure with Colleen speaking to participants from across the world at the First Wild Equid Conference, in Vienna and now the Victorian Brumby Association is part way through the first ever Brumby 100 day Challenge in Australia.

There is so much still to do, so much to continue learning about Brumby behaviours and how we as potential new 'owners' can build on the Brumby Bond relationship.

The ABA has raised its profile to the level that authorities are now starting to contact us for ideas. The last few years developing dialogue and working to promote Brumby values and management to Australian authorities is starting to show results. As Key stake holders, we are responsible for promoting responsible Brumby management in sustainable numbers across Australia.

# Parks Victoria Wild Horse Management Plan

As many of you know, Parks Victoria have been reviewing their horse management plan for the Victorian Alps. Over the last year, ABA have been actively involved in this process with Colleen O'Brien from VBA as member of the Roundtable Group chaired by Parks Victoria and ABA President Jill Pickering lobbying hard for the use of humane methods to manage horse numbers.

A series of Information Sheets and Background Papers were posted on the Parks Victoria (PV) website earlier this year with a call for submissions by 22 July. The papers and submissions are now on the PV website. Both VBA and ABA have provided submissions (submissions 61 and 62).

According to the *Analysis of Public Submissions* on the PV Resources page of their website, 84 submissions were received. Of these, 64 were from individuals with the remaining from interest groups. Sixty-seven submissions considered that wild horse damage was significant and should be a major concern in wild horse management. Fifty submissions supported removal or drastic reduction/control of the brumby population; 42 of these advocated complete eradication. A further 11 supported some level of control. While the consensus is that removal should be humane, almost half the submissions (40) supported some form of shooting as a control method, followed by passive trapping (16) and mustering (12). Shooting is opposed in 11 submissions while aerial culling is specifically supported in 15. *Clearly there is a* lack of agreement on what constitutes humane control.

Parks Victoria are currently preparing a draft plan which will be posted for public comment so there will be another opportunity to voice your views to Parks Victoria.

In a letter to members, ATHRA include a summary of the submissions received to date and a call to action among its members to redress the balance of non-horse interest views.

ABA applauds ATHRA's call to action and urges groups and individuals to take the time to comment during the planning process. Submissions and discussion papers can be viewed on

# Outback Heritage Horse Association of WA

Over the past twelve months the OHHAWA has been busy with several smaller rescues and with promoting heritage horses in the media and on radio. (Much like some of our sister groups, go Kath!)

Two heritage brumbies trapped near Esperance on the south coast - a two year old filly and her younger half-brother - were transported back to Margaret River around October 2012 after their mother was hit and killed on the road. Merrivale Hazel and Merrivale Woody were trained at Rescue Coordinator Dr Sheila Greenwell's property before Woody was sold to a lovely family home and Hazel was fostered to new OHHAWA President Sandy Hall, to give her time to mature and grow a bit. The OHHAWA is fortunate in that it generally sells its rescued brumbies on to good homes to cover partial rescue costs fairly quickly and at present the charity only has a small number of brumbies in its care.



This year, Lake Muir continues to be monitored along with several other groups of heritage brumbies living wild throughout WA. These "Watching Briefs" are important - the

charity networks with local contacts and ensures that any horses which may potentially come under threat are watched. If a situation changes and horses need to be rescued the charity steps in.

This happened in the case of a chestnut filly and mare which were trapped on Carnegie



Station up north. They were accidentally mustered in with cattle and in poor condition, so were given by kind station folk to a

family who took them to Mukenbudin but then, for various reasons, could not continue to care for them. The family surrendered them to the charity to ensure they would have a good future. Jodi and Jaz arrived at one of the rehab properties near Nannup around the second week in October and are currently being trained (voluntarily) and cared for by the charity's Secretary and Treasurer, Katherine and Kevin Waddington. Both horses will be for sale to suitable homes by the charity in the future.

# Save the Brumbies

The *Care for Country* program that has been operating in Guy Fawkes N.P. has now been discontinued due to cut backs by the Federal Government. This is a backward step as park rangers are now responsible for trapping, along with all their other duties. NPWS Rangers across our region are heavily involved with bush fire control and there is no trapping being conducted at present. We do expect horses to come in early in 2014 but without continuous trapping and removal, horse numbers will undoubtedly increase again.

A large crowd attended an **Open Day at the New England Brumby Sanctuary** in

October. Most people gathered at the yards to watch our new Horse Consultant Philip Snell and NEBS manager, Megan Hyde put the horses through their paces. Philip has been training horses all his life, both here and overseas. When asked in an interview with ABC radio what methods he uses he replied, 'Just common sense and kindness, each horse is an individual and must be treated as such'. And that sums up our philosophy, what works for one horse can fail with another.



People were fascinated by the way the horses, at liberty, walk up to him when he beckons them, he points to the horse float and they self-load easily without fuss. That the horses coped with their first expo sure to a large crowd yet were so calm and steady and completely unconcerned with whip cracking and other distractions is a credit to this relatively unknown hero of the horse world. Our thanks to Philip Snell, a welcome addition to our Team and one who works with the horses for us without payment, simply because he loves what he does. And those horses certainly respond to him.

# Victorian Brumby Association

In July this year, VBA launched the *Australian Brumby Challenge*. In October selected trainers attended a compulsory induction day and chose their brumbies from VBA's sanctuary in Beaufort Victoria.

The passively trapped Brumbies will be trained by over 100 days in two sections:

- Brumbies aged approximately four years or older to be trained under saddle; and
- yearling Brumbies to be trained in hand and on the ground only.

Trainers will then present at the final competition weekend on the 1st and 2nd of February 2014, at the Victorian Equestrian Centre in Upper Beaconsfield.

# Hoof Prints – other stories of note

#### Postcard from New Zealand

I seem to be gathering my own little herd of ex-wild horses these days. It was only fitting that I started the 2013 with a new Kaimanawa named Matariki. Matariki was named for The Seven Sisters - an open cluster of many stars in the constellation Taurus. The first appearance, before sunrise, of Matariki in the north-eastern sky indicates the beginning of the Māori year.

Matariki did not come straight from the wild to me. He was mustered two and a half years ago, and ended up much further south down the country from me. I don't know the exact details, but as a freshly mustered colt he was far too wild for the people who adopted him. I can only imagine what he must have been like; he's a horse with a lot of presence about him - the looks of a mustang and coming straight from muster, terrified of people, with a snort that sounds like a gun going off - I can see that for someone with less experience he would have been a bit intimidating.

It didn't work out where he was - there was talk of trying to tranquilize him and other means to tame him. Luckily others intervened and Matariki changed hands. Eventually he ended up with the wonderful people of the Kaimanawa Heritage Horses who took him under their wing. He got lots of patient love and care, and this is where I heard about him, so eventually he made his way up north to me.

The first time I saw him he was coming off the back of transport truck on my driveway. The thing that struck me about this horse is that he has presence, something that's hard to quantify exactly - an elusive x-factor that makes you stand up and take notice, and draws your eye to that particular animal even

when in a herd of others. Even his stance said "look at me, here I am" but had an edge about it, a wildness that showed any wrong move and he might decide to leave the area, quickly.

The truck driver handed me the lead rope and like every other wild horse before him, Matariki had to make the long first walk up the driveway onto the farm. For a horse that looked so wild, the whole way he stuck to me like glue, and anything that scared him, instead of turning and fleeing, he just snuck in closer to me and kept walking. Through a flock of the neighbor's peacocks, chickens and ducks, across the creek and up the hill he was great, mostly taking everything in his stride. Like a horse that been doing it his whole life he marched straight into his new stable and settled in for the night.

Mostly he's been a dream to be with, every so often you'll hear a sound of a gun popping but myself and every other horse on the property has now learned it's just Matariki letting the world know he's seen something suspicious.

At first I couldn't put my finger on exactly what the issues were surrounding this little horse. He galloped around the paddock like a completely wild thing at times before walking straight up to you and putting his head in your chest. From the moment the lead rope was on him he was by your side and the most attentive little horse in the world. To work with, he was highly intelligent, willing and quick, and seemed to really enjoy it. Again, when he did the right thing, he would let out a huge sigh of relief walk up to you and press his head against you. He wanted security and vet was guite bold and afraid at the same time. Terrified of things behind him, yet he would turn to face it and walk right up to investigate what ever had just previously startled him. Something about him was so familiar though.

When I thought about it, I realized that this horse was just like one of the stallions from last muster - Shy Boy, the wildest, spookiest and with that same presence. But when he was haltered for the first time, he melted and completely turned to humans for support and comfort, and became the most attached of all the stallions to people. Matariki would have been just like Shy, but unfortunately had a few bumps in the road to complicate things.

Horses are amazing animals, and Matariki is quickly adapting. Once he learnt the rules and got over some of his anxiety, he was happy being out with a group of kids and ponies all



going in ten different directions around him, calmly and happily allowing them to all come up and

pat him. He's had a visit from the dentist, been saddled, and got used to everything that goes on with running an equestrian business.

Although it has been a bit crazy around here I hope to get on with training and over the next few months Matariki will begin his career as a ridden pony. For all his quirky ways this is one Kaimanawa I absolutely love and think will be something very special in the future.

All the other Kaimanawa's are doing well and excelling in their new lives as riding ponies, Oscar who is still too young to ride, waited very diligently every morning by the gate while I had riding camps, for the kids to come pat, scratch and shower him in affection. One of the only young horses I'd trust to be sensible with a gaggle of girls fussing over him, he is turning into the sweetest pony I've ever come across.

All the Kai's are special in their own way, and hopefully in the future less and less will run into problems like Matariki did. As always it's only lack of knowledge on the part of people and not anything wrong with the horses that sees them end up in bad situations.

In addition to her involvement with Kaimanawa Horses, Chloe is a member of the **Kiwi Care Team**, a NZ based group providing voluntary care and animal welfare education to those in need around the world.

Last March she went to India "to continue to educate and help the working animals and owners over there, and hopefully improve the lives of all involved. "

#### Rising Bitless

Since the days of Xenophon, (and no doubt before) the question of *To Bit or Not To Bit* has been present. Whatever your own views, it is clear that the acceptance of bitless riding is on the rise. Most equestrian events now allow bitless bridles in competitions and the last bastion of bit-only equine endeavors, dressage, is softening – not just on their rules but on the horse's mouth.

Many owners of the "natural Australian horse" are interested in bitless riding, so readers may be interested in further information.
